

# Inspection of Cornbank St James Primary School and Nursery Class

## 1 Purpose of Report

This report outlines the outcome of the above inspection as carried out by Education Scotland in October 2014.

### 2 Background

2.1 Cornbank St James Primary School and Nursery Class was inspected in October 2014 as part of a national sample of primary and nursery education. The report was published on 9 December 2014 and has been distributed to all Elected Members and Church Representatives on the Cabinet for their information. The inspection covered key aspects of the work of the school and nursery at all stages.

Pupil census details for 2014 indicate a total pupil roll of 237. The school's capacity is 330. The occupancy rate is 71.8%. Currently the nursery is a 20/20 provision with 100% occupancy. A new extension opening in January will increase nursery capacity.

2.2 Following the inspection of each school, the Scottish Government gathers evaluations of three important quality indicators to keep track of how well all Scottish schools are doing. Noted below are Education Scotland's evaluations for Cornbank St James Primary School:

- **2.3** The following key strengths were found by the inspection team:
  - Well-behaved and motivated children who are keen to learn.
  - The commitment of staff to continue to improve their practice and children's learning experiences.

- Children's learning experiences in the local community.
- Parents' contribution to the life of the school.
- **2.4** The following areas for improvement were agreed with the Education, Communities and Economy Division:
  - The school should continue to develop the curriculum and ensure that it improves the quality of children's learning experiences.
  - The school should use its tracking and monitoring approaches more effectively to raise attainment.
  - The school, including the nursery class, should develop further its approaches to self-evaluation, involving all stakeholders, to ensure continuous improvement in its work.

### 3 Conclusion

The inspection team has indicated that they are satisfied with the overall quality of provision and are confident that the school's self-evaluation processes are leading to improvements. As a result, they will make no further visits in connection with this inspection. However, the Council will inform parents about the school's performance.

### 4.1 Resource

There are no financial and human resource implications associated with this report.

## 4.2 Risk

Education Scotland visit a sample of schools and nursery classes every year to find out how they are performing. A report is published which informs parents about the key strengths of the school, its capacity for further improvement and sets out the main points for action.

Monitoring, review and evaluation of progress by the Schools Group Manager and members of the 3-18 Improvement Team is the control measure in place to reduce the risk of failure of the school to demonstrate its capacity to improve.
