One less pupil on placement outwith Midlothian would save approximately £120,000 per					
annum. The current budget of the Inclusion Service is £1.9 million and it is proposed to set a					
savings target of £100,000 for the review of Inclusion.

The proposed reduction will need to be carefully balanced to meet the needs of GIRFEC, the Equalities Act and the new Education Act.

2.5% of the overall pupil population of Midlothian have been assessed as disabled: 1.7% of pupils at mainstream primary schools; 1.4% at mainstream secondary schools and the rest attending Saltersgate special school (112 at the time of the 2015 school census).

Shifting services towards prevention and early intervention has been shown to result in both improved outcomes for children and their families and in long-term savings for the Council and other public services. Prevention and early intervention is very much in line with the principles of Getting it Right for Every Child (GIRFEC) and the other provisions of the Children and Young People (Scotland) Act 2014.

A carefully considered review of Inclusion has the potential to achieve both these outcomes.
